General SIG, Q&A**Android SIG discusses BlueStacks for Mac, PC****Pre-meeting SIG**

We switched rooms for the two pre-meeting SIGs this month: Toby Scott moved to the small room, and Michael Shalkey presented an Android SIG in the large room. Scott suggested that we cover the Android SIG for TOE. — Editor

BlueStacks

People who want to run their Android apps on a PC, Mac or TV have a way to do so if the video card on the target machine will support the free program, BlueStacks (<http://www.bluestacks.com>). The new model will be to download software that is linked to a specific email address and that can be used on any machine — a phone, laptop, desktop or TV as the viewer. Users will probably be able to put it on a USB drive to make use even easier.

Many Android game developers are finding that they make more money by giving the game away but charging for advanced features, functionality and virtual goods, such as additional weapons or tools, depending on the game. The plan is similar to, but more subtle than, shareware software, which allows users to test software before buying it. Shareware can

generally be used for a limited time and will shut down if no payment is made.

The system creates a meritocracy. A good game attracts many users, who spread the word about it and buy the so-called freemiums, thus “giving those who do it right money.”

Although Google prefers that users obtain all their Android apps from The Google Play Store, apps are also available from other locations. Going to a different site is called sideloading. “This is where Android and Apple really separate themselves. ... You can’t load my application on your iPad from my website. Apple won’t let you.” The stated reason is that Apple has reviewed the software for malware and other issues, but some people believe that it’s also a matter of money. Apple does not allow apps that perform the same functions that an Apple product does, Shalkey said, citing a camera app developed by Lisa Bettany because it used one of the same commands that the Apple product does. (The app was Camera +; apparently a different app has been created by a different person as Camera Plus. — Editor) Bettany made more than \$2 million in three months (it sold at

\$7.99) before the app was pulled from the store.

Apps for Apple devices can be obtained only through the Apple Store, while Android apps can be obtained from many sites. One such site is the Amazon app store, which is similar to the Google Play Store. Jeff Bezos, the founder of Amazon, is one of the tech world good guys, offering goods and services that are helpful to the customers even if they don’t result in immediate profits for his shareholders, and The Amazon Appstore for Android is a good example of that.

Apple takes 30 percent of every sale on iTunes: music, books, apps, all of it. That is one huge reason Apple wants to keep people from selling from their own websites. Although Google also takes 30 percent (Amazon takes 15 percent) Google does not stop you from selling from your own website.

Problems with apps

Q: I tried to download BlueStacks, and it wanted access to all my devices, contacts and the Internet.

A: I haven't run into some of those problems. There are obvious reasons for some of the things it asks for. The Internet is obvious; that's how you connect, and you need to be connected to use many of the apps because as you do more the app downloads more. Your location is used to gather demographics data.

Q: Don't some companies use the contact lists to send ads to the people on your contacts list?

A: Many do. Uninstall the app if you don't like that. When you're asked to log in with your Facebook account, "that immediately gives them access to all kinds of things," including any personal information you've included on the Facebook page and lists of contacts.

Navigation buttons

Navigation buttons are at the bottom left corner of the Blue Stacks screen, although Shalkey said that on his machine they usually appear in the middle of the bar rather than at the left. Three dots are becoming a standard icon for what is called a "hamburger menu" (bun, meat, bun), another indication that many developers are living on fast foods.

As Michael showed the Jessica Scott book during the SIG (see sidebar for more information on the writer), he said that Germany does not allow books to be sold at discount. If the United States had such a law, he said, many of the brick and mortar bookstores that have shut down, would still be around. It's impossible for the brick and mortar stores to offer the

same kinds of discounts that Amazon can, he said. Michael said his wife, who has been a holdout for paper books, has fallen in love with a Kindle he gave her as a gift. Not only can she have many books at a time on the Kindle so she always has something to read, but she can also watch TV shows and movies, listen to music and read newspapers and magazines on it.

A member of the audience said that many newspapers don't include all the content of the paper editions in their electronic editions. Such things as the comics and weekend magazines are often not included, the speaker said. Others said that the Ventura County Star and Los Angeles Times include all the printed content in the electronic editions, and Shalkey said that newspapers will have to recognize reader desires or fail. Many people under 30, for example, don't subscribe to a print version of a newspaper. In another technology change, he said, many people of all ages no longer have a land line telephone at home, having

switched to cellphones for all uses.

It's only a matter of time until cable and satellite companies lose their customers to Internet service providers for television shows. "It's not here yet. It's very painful for those of you who like CBS. I understand that. It's very hard for people who like sports. I get that." People will go to over-the-air programs, which in many areas is not satisfactory, or Internet service.

That comment sparked a spirited debate with a member of the audience, who said that someone has to provide the Internet service. Once the networks and cable companies are gone, he said, the phone companies will have all the power.

Shalkey disagreed, saying that his Internet service provider is DSL Extreme. Verizon and AT&T don't like that, he said, and are trying to make deals with Google and Netflix to be paid for their content, which would be provided to customers without affecting customers' download limits. Companies that don't make such deals would still be able to send their data, but it would be charged against the data download limits. That's one reason the net neutrality fight is important to average Internet users.

The audience member replied that someone has to bring you the Internet, and you won't be able to do away with the provider.

Shalkey said that's true as long as we're locked into the cable and phone networks, but the Internet can bypass that with wireless signals.

A different audience member said she watches movies on her phone all the time

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The other Jessica Scott

Early in the meeting, Shalkey was displaying a BlueStacks screen of books that included a romance novel by Jessica Scott. It's not Toby's daughter, Jessica, who was at the meeting, but she and everyone else got a lot of laughs out of it.

It turns out that the author Jessica Scott is an on-duty Army officer who writes romance novels, young adult material and nonfiction. Her romance novels include "I'll Be Home for Christmas," "Anything for You," "Because of You," "Until There Was You," "All for You," and "Back to You." Her nonfiction includes "To Iraq and Back," and "The Long Way Home," both of which involve her time in, and return from, Iraq. 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without buffering problems. The movies stream easily, he said.

Shalkey summed by saying he can download BlueStacks for free, install Android apps and play the games on his TV in addition to a PC or Mac.

Asked what kind of tablet he recommends, Shalkey said it depends on what you want to do with one. He loves the Nexus brand and the Kindle Fire and stays away from Apple because of the tight controls the company keeps on things. He likes the unlimited part of the Android world. He said the operating system is more important than the brand name of the device and said users should have at least Android 4.1. Tablets before that version are very old and can't do as much as the newer ones.

He told a questioner that BlueStacks isn't needed on the Kindle Fire, which is already an Android device.

Regular Q&A

Unless otherwise noted, questions are answered by Toby Scott. Michael Shalkey handed the computer duties and answered some questions.

Windows 8 upgrade

Q: I have Windows 7 on my desktop and bought the key code to upgrade to Windows 8. Should I upgrade and is the code still valid? I have a laptop with Windows 8.1.

A: Yes, the code is still good. Whether or not to upgrade is a personal choice, but if you decide to do so be sure you have a couple of hours. If you want to keep your apps and programs, you have to go from Windows 7 to Windows 8 and then from Windows 8 to Windows

8.1. Going directly from Windows 7 to 8.1 wipes out all the programs and data so be sure to back up to an external drive before you make any changes. Backups are not automatic; they must be configured.

Windows 8 accounts

Q: Michael mentioned recovering passwords during the business meeting. Say that I have a Hotmail account and a local account and forget the local account password.

A: Michael Shalkey: I could hack the questioner's local account. He did not have a Microsoft account.

Toby Scott: You can reset the Hotmail account password through Microsoft. When you do that, you can fire up your computer as long as it's connected to the Internet. If you're not on the Internet when you reboot, the computer will use cached credentials, which won't be the ones you changed.

Chromecast

Q: I got Chromecast for Christmas. It plugged into my TV, but all I can look at from the iPad or iPhone is YouTube and Netflix, if I subscribe to it. I can see everything from my laptop in a Google browser. Apple says I need an Apple TV tool. That wasn't clear to me in the original presentations on it.

A: Michael Shalkey: Google is expected to release its Android Package (APK) files, which allow the distribution and installation of software, for Chromecast fairly soon — sometime in March is the rumored date — which should solve a lot of the problems.

Q: I won a Chromecast and it was a nightmare to set up. I was kind of disappointed. I have Intel Wireless Display (WiDi) and there's no comparison. I also couldn't install the unit unless I had a Google account.

A: Michael Shalkey: The quality issue is understandable, but most people don't have WiDi on their computers.

Toby Scott: Today if you don't have Google and Hotmail or Windows Live accounts, you're missing out on half the Internet.

Michael Shalkey: And you need an Apple account if you buy anything on iTunes.

From Windows 8.1 to 8

Q: I gave my sister a laptop with Windows 8 on it. I told her about 8.1, and she upgraded to it but hates it. She called Microsoft, which sent her discs for Windows 8. Will she lose everything if she uses them to go back to Windows 8?

A: Yes. She has to back up everything she has.

Q: When I installed 8.1, Microsoft asked me for a lot of information and wanted me to create a Microsoft account. I didn't do it. Do I still have Windows 8.1?

A: Yes.

Michael Shalkey: But if you want to buy anything from the Microsoft store, you will need an account.

Windows Live account

Q: I have a Windows Live account, which I installed after one of the programs. Every time I go to it, it asks if I want to work online or offline. No matter what I do, it keeps asking the question.

A: Toby Scott: I've never run into that. Do a Google search.

Michael Shalkey: Start Internet Explorer, go the gear and open Internet Options > Advanced > Reset. This will delete your personal material in Internet Explorer, but that's not a problem for me because I don't use it that much. If you do, you might want to tread more lightly. A lot of your online life is hooked through Internet Explorer.

Toby Scott: You can also get to this through the Control Panel > Internet Options > Advanced and click on "Restore advanced settings." The issue is not with Internet Explorer but is more general and concerns the Internet connection options. The Internet Options is not part of Internet Explorer although IE has a link to it. If you go to connections, that's how you get to the Internet. Generally, don't mess with those settings.

Windows 8 upgrade key

Q: When I bought my machine I gave you \$40 for the Windows 8 upgrade and didn't upgrade. I've lost the key. Is it gone forever?

A: You didn't give us (Ventura County Computers) the \$40. You bought the

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key from Microsoft. Throw yourself on the mercy of Microsoft, and explain the situation. It's usually pretty good about such problems. I'm sure you're not the only one who has lost the key.

I suggest that everyone who gets such a key code make a copy of it and put it somewhere that's backed up regularly so you can find it if the drive dies. I created an Installs folder for myself, but anything you'll remember will work.

NTuser.net files

Q: I have a lot of NTuser.net files on my machine.

A: Don't delete them. They have all your computer information and settings for booting, and removing them could turn your computer into a brick.

Q: I have tons of them on my Windows 7 machine.

A: Michael Shalkey: You shouldn't. I found two in the Public folder on this machine. A few minutes later, Shalkey said he also found lots of the files on the machine and said they're normally hidden so people don't delete them by mistake.

Thunderbird to Live Mail

Q: I'm looking at migrating to Windows Live Mail but can't find a way to import settings, mail and contacts from Thunderbird.

A: Toby Scott: I don't think there is one. You can export your contacts to a .csv file (comma separated variable) and nearly everything will import that. But accounts, email and the rest are a different story.

Michael Shalkey: I've had that problem with several customers and haven't found a solution.

Stopping emails

Q: In Outlook 2010, is it better to use Delete, Unsubscribe or Block Sender to control my emails?

A: Don't use "block sender." All that does is slow down your machine because even though the emails might look the same, they'll come from many addresses, so the program will be searching for addresses you'll never get another email from.

Q: So the best thing to do is just delete, delete, delete?

A: If you're trying to get rid of dupli-

cates, you can sort the messages by subject, highlight the first message, go to the end of the messages with the same subject, hold down the SHIFT key and click on the last message. Then hit DELETE to eliminate all of them.

Q: I understand that, but I'm talking about not getting any more mail from certain senders.

A: Just hit the delete key. Managing spam is difficult. I create rules to direct all known messages to certain folders. You can create a number of rules to send messages from senders you know to specific folders. I've done it because I get so much email, and now my Inbox is almost entirely junk mail. If I find something in it from someone I want to get mail from, I create a new rule for that sender. I always check the Inbox before I delete everything, but I seldom find anything I want in it.

Q: There's an unsubscribe link on many of the message, but I haven't used it.

A: Until a few years ago, that was the correct decision because it just confirmed active addresses, but the federal CAN-SPAM Act created stiff penalties for people who ignore the request or keep the address on lists they sell. The Department of Justice doesn't go after the small violators, but it does go after the mass spammers and has put some in jail.

Restore points

Q: I upgraded to Windows 8.1 but had trouble with it. I wanted to restore to before the upgrade but couldn't find any restore points in the window where they should have been.

A: You can't go back from 8.1. You have to do a new installation of Windows 8. You can go back in time in Windows 8.1 but not to downgrade to Windows 8.

Michael Shalkey: Search for system restore points, and you should find several. When you get to the System Restore windows, look for the "show more" message, and click on it.

Q: Are restore points made automatically?

A: They should be created automatically before Windows updates and other Microsoft changes.

Junk mail

Q: How do I stop junk mail in Windows Mail?

A: If you're using Outlook or Live Mail, go to the spam settings and change them to the most aggressive settings. Then check after a while to be sure it isn't blocking messages you want.

In Live Mail, go to Junk > Safety Options and change the setting to High. If you do that, go through what's listed as junk for messages you want. If you find one you want, right click on it and add it to the "safe sender" list. This is much faster than getting all the junk in your inbox and sorting it there. Check the Junk mail folder regularly and delete the messages you don't want. If you sign up for something, the first message is likely to go to the junk mail folder.

Norton Anti-Virus

Q: I have Norton Anti-Virus installed on three machines, and late last month I got a message on my laptop that it was messed up and should be deleted and re-installed. It seems to have happened after an update. I wondered if anyone else had the problem.

A: Probably the Internet connection went down in the middle of the install. Did they give you a link to the Norton uninstall program? (They sent discs.) Symantec by default puts its key codes in a file in the Symantec folder in My Documents. It's generally the Internet connection or a computer hiccup that makes the installations not work correctly.

Finding duplicate files

Q: Can you recommend a good duplicate file finder for Windows 8.1 that's easy to use and preferably free?

A: A check showed the CIPCUG flash drive doesn't have a duplicate file finder.

All of them are slow. I use Duplicate Files Finder on Source Forge (<http://doubles.sourceforge.net/>). SourceForge programs are reviewed for malware and other nefarious things before they're posted.

Chrome bookmarks

Q: How can I organize bookmarks in Chrome?

A: Click on the three-bar logo at the top right and go to Bookmarks > Book-

Program: Ventura County Grand Jury**2 members describe public watchdog agency**

Two members of the Ventura County Grand Jury explained what they do and encouraged CIPCUG members to consider applying for next year's panel.

"People usually think 'Law and Order,' " when they hear about the Grand Jury, said Ann Reeves, who presented the program with fellow grand juror Joy Todd, but the civil grand jury that they described has nothing to do with criminal activities. The jurors serve for 12 months as public watchdogs over county government, 10 cities, special districts and school districts.

The "grand" in grand jury does not indicate it's better than any other jury, she said. It comes from the French word for "large." The Ventura County Grand Jury has 19 members, but that number

varies from county to county. The term "petit jury" — the 12 member groups that consider civil and criminal cases and determine guilt in criminal cases — comes from the French word for "small." The grand juries that make criminal indictments are chosen as needed throughout the year and disband after a single case, she explained.

The civil grand jury "investigates whether local government is serving the best interest of citizens, applying the law fairly and using our resources wisely." Any criminal matters it finds are referred to the District Attorney's Office.

A slide in the PowerPoint presentation explains what the Grand Jury can do:

"The Grand Jury is authorized to:

"Inspect and audit books, records and financial expenditures of local governments.

"Inspect conditions of detention centers and jails.

"Inquire into complaints of government mismanagement.

"Inquire into charges of any misconduct by public officials or employees."

If that sounds like a big job, it is. Grand Jurors must be 18 or older, residents of the county for at least a year immediately before serving, be of average intelligence and good character and have a sufficient knowledge of English. They serve one-year terms, which begin on July 1, and *may* serve up to 35 hours a week Monday through Friday, although that isn't true of every week. On Mondays and Fridays, the jurors generally visit agencies or facilities they oversee. They generally meet in committees on Tuesdays and Wednesdays and as a whole on Thursdays. Service on the Grand Jury is not recommended for people with 40-hour-a-week day jobs, Reeves said.

Documentation for laptop features

Q: I have an Acer laptop that has a lot of fancy, but undocumented, features. I can't find any information about them.

A: Usually you can find that kind of information with creative Google searches. Figure out what the manufacturer calls the program and come up with some other key words and see if that helps.

Michael Shalkey: For you and a few others here, you will probably want to go to the BIOS to change the function keys so they're the old setup. Lots of people don't use the function keys (the ones on the top of the keyboard from F1 to F12), but many who do don't like the changes.

Q: Could we get an article in TOE about how to do that? Many of the AARP tax preparers have the same problem.

A: We'll have the basic idea in the Q&A, but different manufacturers use different keys to get into the BIOS, and the menus differ for each manufacturer. It would be an impossible article to write. Some of the common keys used to enter the BIOS are F2, DELETE, F10 and ESC. Entering the BIOS is done while the com-

puter is booting and before Windows opens.

Windows 8 and POP3 server

Q: I have Windows 8 and my own POP3 mail server. How do I get the two to work together?

A: When you go to the Windows Mail setup, it will try to find your email accounts and pick up the settings from them. Since your private POP3 server won't be known by Microsoft, you'll need to check the "Manual Configuration" box in the lower left corner. Windows 8 Mail is not the same as Live Mail.

In Windows 8, there are enough different apps and programs for some things that it can be difficult to work with them. The Internet Explorer app doesn't look much like the IE program, nor does the Skype app look like the Skype program. It can get confusing having two different programs with the same name that do essentially the same thing.

Up to 10 members of the Grand Jury can be held over for a second year if they want to be, which provides some continuity. At the end of the year, the Grand Jury submits a report to the presiding judge of the Superior Court that describes its work during the year, makes recommendations and might or might not praise agencies or programs it finds especially laudable. All agencies mentioned in the report must submit responses, but they are not required to follow the Grand Jury recommendations.

Grand jurors receive a stipend of \$25 per day and mileage of 56 cents per mile (the rate established by the Internal Revenue Service).

Most Grand Jury investigations start with a complaint from the public on such things as possible misconduct, inefficiencies, unfair treatment and public safety issues. A complaint form is available at <http://grandjury.countyofventura.org>. The form requires a brief summary of the problem, including names and dates. The complaints must be signed and dated, but the names of submitters are not released to the public. The complaints may be mailed, faxed or delivered in person. Complaints may also be submitted as a simple letter, which must contain the same information.

"We're not a 'gotcha' agency," Reeves said.

"The civil Grand Jury does not conduct criminal investigations," one of the slides emphasizes. "If criminal activity is suspected, an investigation is turned over the District Attorney."

The grand jurors are split into investigative committees and support committees. The investigative committees are

Important Grand Jury dates

January-April 15: The civil Grand Jury accepts applications for the following year and conducts an open house. This year's open house was from 3 to 6 p.m., Wednesday, Feb. 5, on the third floor of 646 County Square Drive, Ventura (across from the Government Center).

May-June: Applications are reviewed and 30 possible jurors are invited for two interviews: with current jurors and presiding judges.

June: Up to 10 holdovers members may be considered for a second year's service. A mandatory orientation program is conducted for the 30 people of the proposed jury.

The past year's final investigative reports are issued and posted by June 30.

July 1: A random drawing is conducted from the list of prospective jurors. The new members are sworn in and start the same day.

audit, finance and county administration; cities and joint powers; county services and special districts; health, education and welfare; and law, justices and public safety. The support committees are community relations; complaint review; editorial review; grand jury review; executive; and social committee.

The Grand Jury has no staff, but it does have a budget. The 2012-2013 budget included \$316,358 for the Civil Grand Jury.

Both women said the Grand Jury is a tremendous learning experience, even for people who have been active in the community. Todd said she was especially impressed by the cooperation and coordination of the Ventura County Fire Department, which is a special district that does not include the entire county, and the Ventura County Sheriff's Office, which is headed by the sheriff, who is elected by a countywide vote, as opposed to county supervisors, who are elected from districts. "These agencies getting along is critical to you," she said.

Asked about complaints that the

Grand Jury is ineffective because it can't compel agencies to follow its recommendations, both speakers said the complaints aren't correct. The press reports on recommendations and follows up if agencies don't follow them, they said. One example cited was changes Thousand Oaks made to its policy on destroying trees after a Grand Jury report. The city required the general public to have reports from two arborists saying that a tree should be removed, but the city could remove trees on its own authority. The Grand Jury also recommended changes in the county's permitting process, and jurors have been told by members of the public that the system has improved.

"Some cities blow off the Grand Jury," Todd said, but added that reflects more on the council members involved than it does on the Grand Jury.

Grand jurors must sign confidentiality agreements during their service and cannot discuss their work with anyone. "The Grand Jury speaks as one," Todd said, and even its news releases don't quote anyone by name.

Flash drive update, computer tune up are planned

Obituary

Choosing a Linux distribution

Recently I was asked the question asked by most users of Linux, usually at the beginning of their exploration: What is the best Linux distribution to

use? Answering this question may appear daunting. There are so many distributions to choose from, and yet none of them make themselves known in the usual place — that is, in advertisements — where people are pitched the advantages of one product over another. Since the interest in Linux is there, especially among those seeking an alternative to Microsoft Windows 8.x, I

will give some advice on how to choose a Linux distribution.

The first thing to realize is that the question, “which is best,” is, as it stands, the wrong question to ask. There is no “best” Linux distribution any more than there is one best automobile. Each of us chooses an automobile based on balancing our personal transportation needs. One person will choose a truck, another a minivan, and a third a sports car. Each vehicle is best for each of them while none is best for all of them. The same consideration needs to be made when choosing any operating system: Which one will best suit your personal computing needs? Identifying and prioritizing what you want to do on a computer, how you like to interact with the computer, and whatever else about a computer is important to you will go a very long way toward narrowing down the list of distributions to consider.

The second thing to realize is that the quality of your experience with using Linux will be greatly enhanced if you view the choice not as one of a Linux distribution but one of a community that surrounds a Linux distribution. This is important for various reasons. Foremost among them, this community will be your help desk, and the help will be best if it is given by people using the same distribution and doing the same things on their PC as you are. Someone in that community will likely have already encountered and resolved the same issues and problems that you will come up against, so your requests for assistance will more likely be answered quickly and correctly. Another reason is that the size and vitality of the community is a reflection of the vitality of the distribution. The more there are people and activities on the distribution's forums, responses from developers

and maintainers, and releases of easily available updates and fixes to applications, accompanied by a predictable cycle of new versions of the distribution, the less likely it is that the distribution will disappear, leaving you back at square one.

Once you've adopted these two attitudes, searching the Internet is a good place to go. You can start with some specific searches related to your specific situation, but if you want to get just a feel for the variety of different distributions, you cannot beat the Linux Distrowatch site at distrowatch.com. This is the go-to site for the latest news about Linux distributions, and the "Page Hit Ranking" panel in the right hand column is a proxy for the popularity ranking of the "top 100" distributions. Note that the panel shows the number of hits on each distribution's home page, not the number of people actively using each distribution. Despite this, it provides a decent first-cut ranking of popularity. At this point, I can throw in

some specific advice. Probably most people reading this use PCs in a general way, just surfing the Internet, managing email, doing a bit of word processing and spreadsheets, organizing pictures, and other similar tasks. You are looking for a general purpose operating system, and your choices can be narrowed down considerably. The mainstream distributions in this category, such as Linux Mint, Ubuntu, Fedora, and openSUSE, have been around for a good while, offer very similar suites of applications out of the box, and all can be considered as good distributions. If this describes your search, you'd be forgiven if you limit your choices to these four distributions. Next your decision narrows down to how you prefer to use your computer.

How you interact with your PC is a somewhat broad and ambiguous concept, so I will explain what I mean by it. Using Microsoft Windows as an example, what the PC user interface looks like, how one finds and starts a specific application, and how one interacts with a running applica-

tion changed fundamentally and significantly between Windows 2000/XP and Windows 8. (Similar changes have occurred among the popular general purpose Linux distributions.) Needless to say, many Windows users are upset about this change. Based on my experience and discussions with Windows users, most of those dissatisfied with this change wish for a return to a Windows XP user interface, namely the Desktop Start Button and cascading menu paradigm of finding and launching applications. If so, then consider Linux Mint with Mate. This distribution exists to satisfy a similarly dissatisfied group of Linux users. If you are more amenable to trying different takes on PC user interfaces, then you can consider Linux Mint with Cinnamon or any of the other distributions mentioned above. Some of them provide live CD or DVD images which allow you to run and test them completely from the optical media with no changes made to your existing software. And each has active user

Microsoft Office suite has variety of programs

Microsoft Office is a popular computer program used in homes as well as in businesses, colleges, and universities. Office was first introduced on Aug. 1, 1989, and included many of the still popular programs, Access, Excel, Outlook, and Word.

Access has several good features to create tables to store your data in; designing forms that your data can be easily entered into; creating files that you can find your data in whenever you want to work with it; and generate reports that you can print your data into. A couple of examples of uses are cataloging your CD collection; creating a mailing list for your letters; maintaining a list of the products that you purchased; providing a list of what gifts you have given, etc.

Excel provides a spreadsheet that lets you analyze, chart, format, and manage data. Excel's features import data into cells and rows and help you create summary reports. Excel is a spreadsheet program that originally competed with the dominant IBM's Lotus 1-2-3, but eventually outsold it. It is available for both Windows and Mac platforms. Microsoft released the first version of Excel for the Mac in 1985, and the first Windows version a few years later in November 1987.

Outlook (not to be confused with Outlook Express) is e-

forums, so you have plenty of opportunity to see which ones you find more comfortable and welcoming.

There are plenty of other considerations you could weigh when choosing a Linux distribution, particularly if your computing needs are more specialized. But these suggestions ought to get you started in dissecting the task into discreet decisions which, when made, should quickly narrow down your choices to a manageable few. Before you know it, you'll be asking how you can install your chosen Linux alongside your existing Windows setup. When you do, you'll be on your way.

Kim Komando has a very popular three-hour weekly live radio program (7-10 a.m.) that is heard on over 470 radio stations in the U.S. and two stations in Canada. The local radio station in Santa Barbara is KTMS (990 AM) on Saturdays and Sundays (2-5 p.m.), and in Ventura is KVTA (1590 AM) on the same days but at a different time (4-7 p.m.). Also, there is a Los Angeles radio station KABC

(790 AM) on Saturdays for one hour (6 a.m.). In addition, her one-minute Digital Minutes are aired on more than 100 U.S. stations five days a week (Monday through Friday) and on the local stations of KTMS (990 AM) in Santa Barbara at 1 p.m. and KVTA (1590 AM) in Ventura at 9:55 a.m. In addition, her program provides information on the popularity of personal computers, the use of the Internet, and the complexities of consumer electronics. In addition, she has a syndicated column that appears in USA Today and other newspapers. She publishes

her free e-mail newsletters that include the Tip of the Day, the Cool Site of the Day, the Download of the Day, and the News of the Day. On Saturday, she presents a larger weekly newsletter. Her website shows that you can subscribe to these e-mail newsletters and listen to her. In addition, she has written 12 books on computers and technology. Her website is <http://www.komando.com>. (Radio stations regularly revamp their line-ups and shift programs to new times, so times listed in this article are subject to change.

mail communication software. It's the replacement for Microsoft Mail, Schedule, and Windows Messaging starting in Office 1997. Outlook provides an address book, calendar, e-mail client, and task manager. Outlook features include managing your calendar, contacts, documents, e-mail, files, tasks, and to-do lists.

Word is a word processor and is considered the main program in Office. Its format is standard, although Word 2007 can also use a new Office-optimized format, which has been standardized. Word was also originally available in some earlier editions of Microsoft Works. It is available for the Windows and Mac platforms. The first version of Word, released in the autumn of 1983, was in the Microsoft DOS operating system and had the distinction of introducing the mouse. Word 1.0 could be purchased with a mouse. Word for Mac was released in 1985 and was a popular tool. Word for Mac was the first graphical version of Microsoft Word. Word is a nice, full-featured program that includes automatic formatting, easy-to-create tables, and the ability to create graphics.

Also in Office are several less popular programs: Front Page, Photo Draw, PowerPoint, and Publisher.

Front Page is a program designed to improve the appearance of your websites.

(Microsoft no longer produces Front Page. — Editor)

Photo Draw is a graphics program that has the features of a photo editing program that allow impressive pictures you can include in these Microsoft programs, for example Outlet, PowerPoint, Publisher, and Word.

PowerPoint is a complete presentation package that lets you create fully formatted presentations or slides in only minutes. PowerPoint provides everything you need to produce professional presentations, including drawing, formatting, graphing, and outlining. PowerPoint is a popular presentation program for Windows and Mac. It is used to create slideshows composed of text, graphics, movies, and other objects, which can be displayed on-screen and navigated through by the presenter or printed out on slides or transparencies. It's a complete presentation graphics package that lets you create fully formatted presentations or slides in only minutes. PowerPoint provides everything you need to produce professional presentations, including drawing, graphing, outlining, and text formatting.

Publisher is a complete desktop publishing product that makes it easy to publish from your desktop printer, commercial printing services, copy shops, or on the World Wide Web.

The version of Office that I use is version 2000. The reason is that I telephoned a question about Microsoft Office into a live radio computer program back then, and I received from Microsoft its Office 2000 Premium, which included Access, Excel, Front Page, Outlook, PowerPoint, Publisher, Shared Clip Art, Small Business Tools, and Word. I installed and use only two of programs: Excel which I use daily for tracking my family's medical expenses and tracking the performances of our stocks, and Word, which I use daily for writing articles for the club's monthly TOE newsletters, writing letters, and creating other projects, lists, calendar, etc. It is a nice feature that you can install only the programs that you want to use. Also, I have installed and tried a more current version of Word, for example, but didn't like its changes to the toolbars of Office version 2010 compared to Office version 2000.

There are currently four versions of Office 2013 available. The features and costs of these versions are: Home Premium for \$99.99; Office, Home, and Student for \$139.99; Office, Home, and Business for \$219.99; and Office Professional for \$399.99. All versions contain Excel, One Note, PowerPoint, and Word. In addition, Home Premium, Office Home & Business, and Office Professional include e-mail, calendar, and tasks.

Get Plain Text simplifies copying Web pages

It's probably safe to say that everyone has copied text from a Webpage at some time and pasted it into an email or into a Word-like program. So, of course, you can relate to my dismay of pasting the type complete with its

formatting riding piggyback on it.

I always have to stop what I'm doing and unformat and reformat the type so it blends in with what I'm working on.

I can hear "oldtimers" yelling, "Notepad! Use Notepad!"

That's true. And, it's a good option. I'm using Windows XP (still), so I have a shortcut to Notepad on my Start menu. It's very easy to click on Start while I have my browser open and click to open Notepad to paste the Web text, then re-

copy it from Notepad, and repaste the text into a document.

But I found a simpler method.

Really. There is no learning curve.

I only have to click once after copying from a Web page and then I can immediately paste unformatted text into anything anywhere!

With our typical complicated programs to work with, this just doesn't seem possible. Or maybe alchemy might

be involved!

The short of it is that this is true, no hocus pocus. It is possible with a tiny program called Get Plain Text.

It's only 70 Kb. and it doesn't add an icon to your system tray or grab any memory when you use it.

It works in less than a second to remove text formatting, including fonts, sizes, colors, and embedded images. It

just leaves plain text.

Download the program from the developer's webpage (clipdiary.com) at <http://bit.ly/1bzFuea> or a secondary download site at <http://www.softpedia.com/get/PORTABLE-SOFTWARE/Office/Clipboard/Portable-Get-Plain-Text.shtml>. Save it to your preferred disk location. Click on the program to run it.

Add the icon that launches Get Plain Text to your Quick Launch bar or favorite program launcher.

I keep it on my Quick Launch bar. As soon as I copy something to the clipboard, I click on the Get Plain Text icon. Then, I paste the text anywhere I desire. That's it.

When I use Get Plain Text, no window opens. There are no dialog boxes or preferences to select. There are no flags, bells, or whistles to tell me it is finished. It simply works fast, silently, and unobtrusively.

What else? Oh, yeah. It's free!

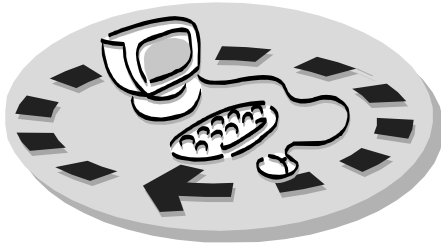

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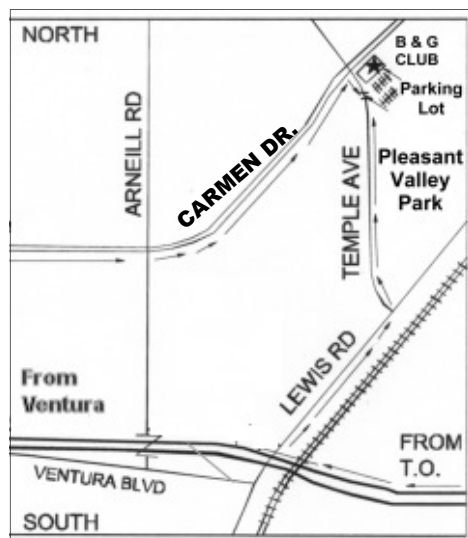
