

Long-time members share CIPCUG memories

Before getting to memories of the club, a few words may be in order as to why we bought the Leading Edge computer that led to our being involved with the formation of the club. While working at Point Mugu, I was a member of a group that coordinated bringing speakers to the base. One of these was Adm. (then Commodore) Grace Hopper. The first use of the term “computer bug” is attributed to her. I picked her up at the Officers’ Club and had breakfast with her. I was able to get more acquainted with her than I might otherwise. She was quite an amazing person. Her talk later that day about the early days of computing and what she saw for the future made a lasting impression on me. One of her main points was that we should assure that our children were computer literate because computers were going to be a big part of their lives. Very prophetic! At the time I had no visualization of the degree to which computers would become be a part of the lives of my children and grandchildren.

I took Commodore Hopper’s words to

heart. After bouncing the idea off of

Kathy, I ordered a Heathkit H89 computer kit. I had previously built several Heathkits; this would be my most challenging project. Amazingly, after the lengthy assembly process, it worked. I introduced our grade school-aged son and daughter to using a computer. Around then our son learned to type on an old-fashioned typewriter. He had fine motor problems that made writing difficult and typed his school papers. When he got to middle school, the papers became longer. We realized that we needed a computer that had word processing software to make his work easier. After researching what was available, we decided on the Leading Edge computer. There was a Leading Edge store on Main Street in Ventura. At the time, Kathy thought that the Leading Edge was all the computer we would ever need. Now our household of just the two of us has two desktop computers running Windows 7 (his and hers), a laptop computer running Vista (ours for trips), a netbook computer running Windows 7 (mine for doing genealogy research at the library), and our old laptop running XP that is in the ham

shack.

To start with, our son was the main user of the computer. Kathy heard about a Leading Edge User Group being formed and went to the initial (or at least an early meeting). She wanted to find out more about what we could do with our new computer. She had been a computer programmer on mainframe computers when she worked at Point Mugu (machine language, Cobol, Fortran, etc.). I forget how many meetings she attended before I first went. She jokingly says that it is unfair that I have member number 19 and she is number 20 when she was there first.

The Leading Edge User Group organized, and we became charter members. We were small at first but slowly grew in numbers. I was either secretary or treasurer on an early board. I do not remember when I started or how many years I was, but I remember that Lois Evans was president (in her first time on the board) while I was on the board. In order to get more members, we decided to change the name to something more inclusive. Thus we became the Channel Islands PC Users Group. Besides Walt Yates and Lois Ev-



ans, I think Bob de Violini was also a charter member. If not the first newsletter editor, he was one of the first and filled that position for many years.

My name is Bob Burnett, and I am a charter member of LEUG/CIPCUG. My member number is 006.

In 1987 The Leading Edge Computer was very popular and the company encouraged and supported computer user groups.

Both Oxnard and Ventura College used Leading Edge computers. The college and local dealers encouraged forming clubs.

Several users in Oxnard/Camarillo encouraged forming clubs.

In 1987 those interested were invited to a meeting at the home of Walt Yates. In attendance were Walt Yates, Don Click, Bob and Lois de Violini, Ralph Wafel and Bob Burnett.

Walt Yates was able to control differences and the club was formed.

Walt Yates was elected president; Don Click, vice president; Lois de Violini, secretary; Ralph Wafel, treasurer; Bob de Violini, news editor; and Bob Burnett, membership chairman.

We purchased a Leading Edge computer and had a Saturday meeting each

month. We advertised the club through dealers, colleges and computer shows and through the newsletter, The Outer Edge, an immediate success.

We met at the Camarillo Library. As we grew we added a second monitor to improve viewing. I recall that one member named Ericson brought binoculars for a better view.

We purchased a coffee pot and sold coffee and doughnuts at meetings.

I had a truck and transported equipment to and from meetings as well as picked up doughnuts for several years.

We enjoyed two computer publications distributed free to Los Angeles and Ventura. They delivered 200 each to my home in Oxnard, and I brought them to the meetings.

When they discontinued Ventura delivery they delivered to my office in Los Angeles, and I brought them home until meeting day.

Art Fiedler and I printed the mailing labels and attached them to the newsletter. We ran them through the printer twice, once for the name and address and a second time for a graphic.

I am the author of the statement print-

ed in our monthly newsletter "The Friendly Computer Club Helping Make Computers Friendly."

We later changed our name to Chanel Islands PC Users Group (CIPCUG) after the Leading Edge computer company went out of business.

In my opinion the continued success of our club is due to our friendly members, excellent leaders and excellent newsletter. Have you expressed your appreciation to John Wiegler? If you have not, please do!

Robert (not Bob) Provart commented that he joined the club because of the warm welcome received in his first visit.

We wore nametags every meeting and after each meeting, we dumped them in a box. Next meeting several people helped sort them on a table.

When Stan Ranson became the membership chairman, he made wood folding cabinets to store nametags alphabetically. Thanks again, Stan!

When Bob de Violini resigned as editor, many of us worried, but Stan Ranson took over and did a wonderful job as John is doing now.

Lois de Violini saved the club "a tons" of money. We rented the airport location from the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District for \$300. Lois provided computer service to the district in exchange for free rent. Thank you again,




Accessing Linux music files from Windows

Suppose you are a full-time user of open source software at home. All of your PCs run Linux, all of your applications are open source, and all of your file formats are free, open, and unencumbered by the threat of patent litigation. Your portable hard drive has been reformatted to the ext4 file system, and your entire music collection has been ripped to high-quality flac files. Now, what do you do when you'd like to listen to your music while working on a Windows PC with Windows Media Player? This can be a problem: Windows can't even see your music, and, regardless, Media Player can't play them. Luckily for you, a solution is available with Ext2Fsd and Xiph's Directshow Filters. With them, you can listen to your music with Media Player.

The first task is getting Windows to see your music files. This is where Ext2Fsd comes in. Go to the project website, www.ext2fsd.com, to find download links. There are several files available, but you need only the executable install-

er, Ext2Fsd-0.51.exe or later. Once the file is downloaded, run it from the Windows PC, which must be running Windows 2000 or later. Soon, a dialog box will appear asking you to select additional tasks to perform during installation. Make sure the options are unchecked except for the first one, which will set up Ext2Fsd to run when the PC boots. The installation is quick, and, when it's done, you will be asked if you wish to run Ext2Fsd's Volume Manager to assign drive letters to your Linux storage. I recommend that you do not and, instead, let the installation complete, and then reboot your PC to ensure that Ext2Fsd runs properly. Once the PC is running again, you should see a stylized Ext2 icon in your system tray, indicating that the Ext2Fsd driver was successfully started. Now plug in your portable storage with the Linux file system, wait a moment and then run the Ext2 Volume Manager, which you will find under the Start button, All Programs in the Ext2Fsd program folder, or from the System Tray icon. The Manager displays the hard drives connected to the PC, with their partitions. Your Linux partition will appear as a File system of type RAW and a Partition type of Linux. Select this partition, then select the Tools menu, Mountpoint Management. Here you assign a drive letter to your Linux partition

and the method used to mount it. The method to use is the second, Automatic Mount via MountMgr. This allows your drive to be assigned the same drive letter each time you use it. Just remember that this method requires the Ext2 Volume Manager to remain running after the letter is assigned, so remember to minimize it back to the System Tray. The OK button saves your choices and exits you from the dialog. Now the Volume Manager should display your Linux partition along with its drive letter and file system type (ext2, 3, or 4). (Note that on subsequent reboots, you will need to open up the Ext2 Volume Manager after you plug in your Linux portable media and either choose Tools, Reload and Refresh or press the <F5> key in order to assign the drive letter to the media.) Now that your drive has a letter, it should be as visible and useable from Windows Explorer as any other. But still, your music is unplayable.

The codecs distributed by the Xiph Directshow Filters project will give Windows Media Player the ability to play your music. Downloads can be found from the project page at www.xiph.org/dshow — you want the `opencodecs.exe` installer file. Run it to start the installation, which is quick and requires no decisions from you. When installation is com-

plete, you should be able to find your music and playlist files. Right click one of them, choose Add to Windows Media Player Playlist, and soon hear the music play. Enjoy it!

Not that there aren't some gotchas. One is that Linux allows certain characters, such as ':', '?', '&', and others, to be used in file and folder names that Windows forbids. Any such files and folders will be visible in Windows Explorer and file dialog boxes, but otherwise unusable and unplayable. Issues that others have experienced are receiving a "The parameter is not right" error upon logging into Windows (just disable User Account Control from the Control Panel, User

Accounts Settings), and the Driver Signature Enforcement feature in Windows causing problems with the Ext2Fsd service. This can be fixed by pressing the <F8> key at the proper time when booting, then selecting Disable Driver Signature Enforcement option, and then resuming the boot.

Using open source software and Linux at home doesn't mean that you are unable to access your files on a Windows PC or use Windows applications with them. Ext2Fsd and Directshow Filters are two examples of open source utilities that help you do what you want to do no matter what PC you are using. They also illustrate that wherever a need for software is identified, an open source community

is bound to sprout up and address the need. Such is the spirit of open source.

If you have questions or would like to learn more about Linux and FOSS, come to the October CIPCUG Linux SIG meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday the 23rd at Ventura County Computers in Ventura. As luck would have it (or, not), we no longer have a Windows installation on the CIPCUG PC to demonstrate open source software on. So we will discuss Ext2Fsd and Directshow Filters and try to help anyone with a computer problem or question.

Plop, plop, fizz, fizz; oh what a relief it is

For the youngsters reading this, Alka-Seltzer is an effervescent antacid and pain reliever first marketed by the Dr. Miles Medicine Co. in 1931. In 1932 the radio show *Alka-Seltzer Comedy Star of Hollywood* began, with *National Barn Dance* following in 1933, along with many more. The radio sponsorships continued into the 1950s, ending with the *Alka-Seltzer Time* show.



Two years after its launch came the repeal of Prohibition in the U.S., and Alka-Seltzer became Miles' new flagship product, displacing Miles Nervine Tonic.

In 1951, the "Speedy" character was introduced. Originally Sparky, the name was changed to Speedy to align with that year's promotional theme, "Speedy Relief." He appeared in more than 200 TV commercials from 1954 to 1964. Speedy's body was one Alka-Seltzer tablet, while he wore another as a hat; he proclaimed Alka-Seltzer's virtues and sang the "Plop, plop, fizz, fizz" song in his high, squeaky voice (provided by veteran juvenile voice actor Dick Beals. In December 2010, Alka-Seltzer began a series of new commercials featuring Speedy, using CGI effects to re-create the stop-motion puppetry of the 1950s and 1960s,

with Speedy voiced by Debi Derryberry. What's really scary is Speedy looks a lot like me as a boy

That is exactly how I felt last month when the final hamburger was served. The 25th Year CIPCUG Celebration was over, and I got my life back. I may not be so quick to volunteer for something like that again. Hey, wait! I didn't volunteer. Some Windows features and how to tweak them

Windows 7 good things

Here's list of four interesting Windows 7 operating features that are totally different from the other Windows operating systems and very useful.

PEEK — On your desktop, you can temporary reduce the size of all opened programs or expand the size of all previously reduced programs.

1. On your desktop, click on the small rectangular button located in the lower right hand corner of your desktop and all open windows are minimized.

2. Click rectangular button again and all reduced programs are restored to back to their previous location and size.

SEARCH — This provides an easy and quick way to find things.

1. Click on the Windows Start.

2. Type the item that you want to search for in the Search programs and files box.

3. Select what you are looking for from the list of programs and/or files that appears.

SNIP — This is a special feature where you can copy or send whatever you selected from a program, a drawing, a photograph, etc.

1. Click on the Windows Start.

2. In the Search programs and files box, type snip.

3. Click on Snipping Tool.

4. Click on new.

5. Drag the special cursor around the

area that you want to capture.

6. Now you can save, copy to the same or another program, or send the captured area.

7. If you like, you can arrange the captured areas for viewing side-by-side.

This feature is very similar to the services provided by the popular software program PrintKey Pro.

TASKBAR — It is very convenient to have your popular programs easy to access without the need to use your Start Menu.

1. If the program is already on your desktop, but not on your taskbar, right-click the program's icon.

2. Click Pin this program to the taskbar.

3. Now your program icon will always to be listed on your taskbar.

4. You can pin a file, folder, or even a website, such as the CIPCUG website, to your taskbar.

Possible improvements

There are several common and frequently used Windows XP and 7 features that I like to improve. These features include changing the quantity of mouse clicks required from two to only a single click; turning off all Windows sounds; and easily renaming a group of files. In all my instructions, "to click" means a left mouse click and for any right clicks, I will state a right click.

CHANGING FROM TWO MOUSE CLICKS TO A SINGLE ONE

— This makes it much easier when using your mouse as only a single click is need-

ed and no longer two clicks.

1. Click on your Start Menu.

2. On the right side of all the programs listed, click on Control Panel.

3. Click on Folder Options.

4. On the General page, click on Single-click to open an item.

5. Click Apply at the bottom of the page.

You now have the easy single mouse click feature.

WINDOWS SOUNDS — This turns off all of your Windows sounds, which I find very nice. This does not change the sounds in any of your other programs.

1. Click on your Start Menu.

2. On the right side of all the programs listed, click on Control Panel.

3. Click on Sound or Sound and Audio Devices.

4. Select the Sounds tab.

5. In the Sound Scheme box, click on the down arrowhead.

6. Select No Sounds, and click on Apply and then OK.

RENAMING A GROUP OF FILES

— I find this very helpful in renaming vacation photos.

1. Go to Windows Explorer and select all the files that you want to rename.

2. Press F2 and type the proposed name of all of the selected files.

3. Now press Enter. Each photo will have the same name, but there will be a number in parentheses following the name starting with number 1. For example, London (1), London (2), etc.



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
